

As a Governing Body we will strive to support the Head Teacher, Senior Leadership and the whole Teaching and Non-Teaching staff as much as we possibly can, to achieve these aims.

Before I became a Parent Governor in 2016, the role of the Governing Body was a mystery to me. I'm sure it may well be to you too, so I wanted to highlight just a few of the activities we are engaged in on a regular, as well as ad-hoc, basis.

School development plan – the SDP is as an annual plan relating to overall school improvement and linked to the long-term strategic plan. It covers everything from curriculum matters and learning to wellbeing and behaviour.

School Policies

All school policies are reviewed on a regular basis. Copies are available on request and details can also be found on the school's website.

School Prospectus

There was a minor change to the whole school prospectus to reflect a change to the uniform code. The prospectus is available on the school website.

School Language Status

St David's High School designated language category is English.

The Use of the Welsh Language

St. David's High School is an English medium school and no student comes from a home where the first language is Welsh. Our policy, however, is to promote the use of transactional Welsh throughout the school as fully as possible. Form tutors are encouraged to use Welsh words of the week during the group periods.

As a subject within the curriculum, Welsh 2nd language is taught to all students in all year groups. Year 11 students follow a short course GCSE in Welsh

Healthy Living

The school places a high priority on the safety and healthy choices of the learners in our care. Learners are given the opportunity to develop their awareness and understanding of healthy living through a range of activities across the curriculum. Teachers develop understanding of healthy living through a learning focus on healthy eating and the importance of active lifestyles.

The school also effectively promotes healthy lifestyles through extra-curricular activities.

Sport Provision

At St. David's High School, via a programme of Physical Education, the Faculty strives:

- -to create and foster opportunities for the study and practice of movement in all aspects;
- -to create and foster opportunities for the acquisition, development and improvement of motor skills;
- -to provide a means of enjoyment;
- -to create and establish opportunities for vigorous exercise and promote physical development of muscular and cardio-vascular aspect of the human body;
- -to develop the acquisition of sound effective skills through opportunities fostered by co-operation with fellow students, and the development of positive leadership qualities;
- -to satisfy the needs of National Curriculum in Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4.
- -Coaching sessions and matches against neighbouring schools are held after school and students have the opportunity to take part in area and national competitions.

Toilet Facilities Provision

The school meets the requirements for the provision of toilet facilities. The cleaning arrangements for these facilities are carried out by a dedicated team of cleaning staff who have been appropriately trained.

CURRICULUM

A Curriculum for Wales

A school curriculum is a plan for what children and young people will learn at school. It states what pupils should learn, how they should learn and the reasons why they should learn.



What's it all about?

The new curriculum will be a journey based on knowledge, skills and experience.

These four purposes will be the foundation of the new curriculum. All children and young people will get support to be:

Ambitious, capable learners who are ready to learn throughout their lives

Enterprising, creative contributors who are ready to play a full part in life and work

Ethical, informed citizens who are ready to take part in Wales and the world

Healthy, confident individuals who are ready to lead fulfilling lives as valued members of society.

Areas of Learning and Experience (AOLE)

The new curriculum is about helping pupils connect their learning. As well as learning literacy, numeracy and digital skills, there will be six areas of learning and experience.

- Expressive Arts
- Health and Well-being
- Humanities
- Languages, Literacy and Communication
- Mathematics and Numeracy
- Science and Technology



What Matters Statements

Each area of learning and experience has Statements of what matters in learning. They help pupils think about what they are learning. They help pupils see how topics link to each other, to work and to life.

Why a new curriculum?

The world is changing. There are lots of new challenges that will need new technology and new ideas. The Welsh Government wants young people to have the knowledge, skills and experiences you'll need to succeed.

Learners with Additional & Behaviour Needs

We aim to maximise the entitlement of pupils with Additional Educational Needs to a broad balanced and relevant curriculum by fostering a caring, co-operative community, in which all individuals are equally valued. To this end pupils with Additional Educational Needs are given additional attention and support. This policy outlines (dependent on children's Additional Educational Needs), how this is planned, organised and should be read in conjunction with other school documentation, e.g. School Prospectus, Individual Curriculum Policies, Behaviour Guidelines and the school's Accessibility Plan. (This policy is consistent with guidance in the Additional Educational Needs Code of Practice for Wales).

Our objectives for all pupils including those with Additional needs are:

- to be fully included in the life of the school
- to be literate
- to be numerate
- to have a wide range of communication skills
- to develop effective social skills in preparation for the world of work
- to develop appropriate social skills and a sense of self discipline
- to become more independent as learners as they mature
- to have opportunities to work with a range of adults and pupils
- to benefit from suitable resources and appropriate technology to support their areas of need
- to have a positive attitude towards themselves, their peers, the staff and school as a whole

Our objectives for teaching and support staff who work closely with pupils are:

- to ensure all are trained to support pupils with Additional Educational needs, which could include such diverse needs as Specific Learning Difficulties, including Dyslexia, Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) and pupils on The Autistic Spectrum (ASD).
- to be familiar with resources and technology that can support pupils with Additional Educational needs
- to have access to other professionals from a variety of agencies for expert advice and diagnosis to use a range of teaching styles and learning opportunities to meet the needs of all pupils in the class
- to foster effective lines of communication between the class teacher, support staff, and ANCO to ensure appropriate provision and support for pupils with AND
- to work closely with parents of pupils, to ensure a partner-ship approach for the benefit of the child to maintain effective links with support services and the Local Education Authority (LEA)Governors continue to be grateful for the important work carried out by the Assistant Support Workers in the Special Learning Area.

Provision for Learners with Disabilities/ Access Arrangements

Parents may be invited to meet with any of the following in order to discuss the individual needs of the student: Headteacher, ALNCO, Pastoral Staff, the School Nurse, the Inclusion Welfare Officer and outside agencies where appropriate.

Disabled toilets for both sexes are also available on the ground floor. Alterations to the main entrance have allowed for direct wheelchair access to the school. There is also a lift available.

Provision for More Able and Talented Learners (MAT)

The school has recently developed its provision for More Able and Talented learners. Whilst lessons are fully differentiated with extension activities designed to further develop the more able and talented, we also offer quality enrichment activities beyond the classroom that focus on enjoyment and that provide a range of experiences to stretch our learners. We are committed to identifying and meeting the needs of these children as early as possible in order to enable them to achieve their potential.






