OUR SCHOOL

Transition and Induction at St. David's High School

KEY STAGE 3

Pupils are allocated to tutor groups under the specific care of a tutor as soon as they begin their years at St. David's High School. The groups are numbered but there is no order of ranking-all the groups are equal.

This allocation takes place after extensive discussion and liaison with our family of primary schools. These groups are the units for registration, tutorial work, assembly, social and sporting activities as well as for a significant proportion of lessons.

At KS3 (Years 7-9) the statutory National Curriculum compromises of Mathematics, English, Science, Design, Information Technology, Geography, History, Religious Studies, Music, Art, Physical Education, Welsh, Modern Foreign Language and Sex Education.

Careers and Guidance

We want our pupils to be as prepared as possible for their future. At St David's we have a team of staff available to help pupils with their personal development. It is important for them to be able to speak with people that they can trust.



Careers Wales supports the school's careers education provision by providing an impartial careers information and guidance service to all our pupils and parents.

Careers Wales staff are available for interviews with individual students and parents to assist with career related decisions. In Year 11 pupils are entitled to at lease one careers interview.

KEY STAGE 4

Every pupil receives a balanced, challenging curriculum which caters for individual aptitudes and interests without closing down options that may be required later.

Around February in Year 9, pupils are given a degree of choice in relation to subjects to be studied in Year 10. This information on options is conveyed to parents at the same time and the final option choices are made only after full consultation between students, parents and teaching staff.

At KS4 (Years 10 & 11) the statutory National Curriculum compromises of English, Mathematics, Science, Physical Education, Religious Studies, Welsh, Personal, Social and Health Education and Skills Challenge Certificate.

In Years 10 & 11 all pupils follow a "core" curriculum in which the study of English, Mathematics, Science, Religious Studies, Welsh and Physical Education is compulsory.

In addition all pupils follow a programme of Personal and Social Education which includes aspects of moral education and careers guidance. Work appreciation is arranged for all students during the Summer term of Year 10. In Year 11 students have at least one interview with a Careers Officer when individual guidance is provided concerning career routes.

Pupils may then choose three subjects from a range of possibilities which may include:-Art, Health, Social Care and Child Care, Digital Technology, Product Design, Drama, French, Spanish, Geography, Travel and Tourism, History, Music, Physical Education, Religious Studies, Welsh, Hospitality and Catering and Triple Science.

Certification is chiefly GCSE, though in some subjects students receive alternative qualifications such as BTEC's, City and Guilds. By following the core and option subjects pupils may gain nine or more GCSE qualifications.

Transitioning to secondary or high school can feel like a huge leap for children and their families.

St David's High School employs a range of strategies throughout the transition process.

- Open Day for Year 6 pupils.
- Visits to all Year 6 pupils by our transition team in their primary schools to discuss the transfer process.
- Collation of information via the Flintshire transfer document.
- Visits to all pupils with additional learning needs to discuss their individual needs. This would involve meetings with individual pupils, parents and primary school teachers to identify the specific needs of the individual pupils and draw an Individual Education Plan for each child. This plan would identify the individual learning needs of the student.

A range of sporting activities run for primary schools on our site.

- Visits by Year 6 pupils to curricular areas.
- Year 6 Induction Day when pupils spend a day in school and then parents come in the evening for information sharing and advice.

Reporting to Parents

Formal parents' meetings are held for each year group and parents receive full written reports on their child's progress once a year. In addition, interim progress reports will be issued at least twice during the course of the year.

Personal, Social and Health Education

Schools play a central role in having a positive and sustained impact on children and young people's sexual health and well-being. At St. David's we aim to present facts to pupils which will result in them considering their own attitudes to sexual behaviour and which will enable them to make informed, reasoned and responsible decisions regarding their adulthood. We offer individual counselling through Form Tutors, Key Stage Managers, our Family Liaison Officer, School Counsellor and School Nurse. We liaise closely with outside agencies, which can provide support for individual students.

Support of Learners

Pupil well-being is of paramount importance at St David's High School. The pastoral care system is based on the principle of consideration, care and concern for every pupil. Pastoral care provided by the school is centred on the form group.

Each pupil is allocated to a form group with an assigned Form Tutor and each year group is led by a Pastoral Leader. This pastoral team remains the same from Year 7 to Year 11 enabling pupils and form tutors to get to know each other very well and the form tutor will have central roles in monitoring and coaching pupils in their tutor groups.

ADDITIONAL LEARNING NEEDS

These may be of a physical, sensory, emotional, social or intellectual nature and include children with learning difficulties. The school policy for pupils with Additional Learning Needs (ALN) complies with the Codes of Practice and is available from the school office.

The policy is that of integration into mainstream classes with support, the form of which will vary according to the individual needs of the child. Strategies include: teacher assistants in the classroom to work alongside the subject specialists; voluntary attendance at break or lunchtime in The NEST.

Staff with responsibilities for Additional Learning Needs liaise carefully with primary school teachers and parents, when appropriate, and with outside agencies such as the school's Psychological Service, Physiotherapists, Speech and Language Therapists, and other specialists.

The school's NEST Base is open every morning from 8.30 and every break and lunchtime. The room has been specially designed for learners of all abilities and ages to use as a base for extra work. There is always a teacher present and available to help with difficulties. The STAR Support Base supports pupils with emotional and behavioural needs, acting for some pupils as a short-term consequence and for others as a longer term support mechanism.

Whilst in the base pupils continue with their studies and access one-to-one support from a specialist team of staff. Where relevant, pupils are encouraged to explore the reasons for behaviour and how to redress these patterns through daily restorative sessions.

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More Able & Talented

Whilst lessons are fully differentiated with extension activities designed to further develop the more able and talented, we also offer quality enrichment activities beyond the classroom that focus on enjoyment and that provide a range of experiences to stretch our more able pupils. We are committed to identifying and meeting the needs of these pupils as early as possible in order to enable them to achieve their potential. Our enthusiastic staff provide a fun yet challenging experience for all. Pupils are invited to attend a series of enjoyable, creative and stimulating workshops. These typically include: mathematics, science, art, drama, music, debating, design technology and other workshops are being added all the time.

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School Day



The school day commences at 8.40 am and finishes at 3 pm. There are five one-hour sessions each day, giving a total of 25 teaching periods per week. The school runs a two-week timetable and pupils will be issued with this on their first day in September.

Homework

Homework is set on a regular basis for all. The completion of homework, coursework, private study and revision after school hours is critical if pupils are to be successful and achieve their FULL potential. The involvement and support of parents in ensuring their children have both adequate facilities and the necessary time set aside to complete homework is also critical and is much appreciated by the school.

All pupils are supplied with homework diaries at the start of the school year and these can be referred to and signed by parents. If young people are to gain GCSE results which reflect their true capabilities, pupils in the upper school should be working on their studies for approximately 2/3 hours per night. This is of course a guide for parents and may vary. In Year 11 in particular, many staff organise after school homework clubs. All pupils should take advantage of these opportunities.

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Home School Agreement

The Home School Agreement is signed by pupils, parents / carers and the Headteacher.

It sets the standard for us to work together with close co-operation, shared values and expectations. A copy of the agreement is included within the pupils planner



School Uniform

At St David's High School, we expect pupils to wear their uniform with pride. We believe uniform can assist in supporting positive behaviour, discipline and protect students from social pressures to dress in a particular way. Our uniform is designed to be practical and inexpensive and items are readily available from main department stores.

Physical Education

Recommended garments

All pupils are expected to participate in Physical Education unless excused on medical grounds supported by a note from the doctor. The following clothing is necessary for full participation and can be ordered from the school supplier during the New Intakes Parents Evening.

In the interests of hygiene, a towel and a change of undergarment is needed.

- For gymnastics pupils will work in bare feet in accordance with national guidelines.
- All P.E. items should be clearly marked with the pupils' name.
- It would be helpful if indoor footwear could have non-marking soles.

Health and Safety

- Pupils are advised that the wearing of a mouth-guard can in some circumstances offer a measure of protection against mouth/jaw injury, and that a properly fitted mouth-guard will probably offer the best protection.
- Where mouth-guards have NOT been individually fitted by a dentist or dental technician, it is essential that any manufacturers instructions relating to the wearing of the mouthguard are strictly followed.

Whatever its origins a mouth-guard must fulfil the following criteria:

- It needs to fit comfortably but tight.
- It needs to be easily remove able.
- It should not impair breathing in any way.
- In the interest of oral hygiene, it should be made of a substance that can be effectively cleaned.

Gym & Athletics

- Black t-shirt with logo
- Black shorts with logo
- Training shoes

Make-up

- Make-up is not allowed in the lower school-Years 7,8 and 9
- The use of make-up is not to be encouraged in the upper school-Years 10 & 11
- When make-up is used discreetly it will be acceptable

Jewellery

- Pupils are allowed to wear a watch, necklace and a maximum of one ring per hand. If earrings are to be worn they must be studs (no more than one earring allowed per ear)
- No form of body piercing including nose and facial piercings are permitted.
- Any unsuitable jewellery including badges or brooches will be confiscated and kept in the school safe until collected by a person with parental responsibility
- Jewellery must be covered for P.E. and handed to the P.E. teacher for safekeeping in a clear plastic envelope with the student's name written clearly on the outside.
- If pupils choose not to follow this advice and loss or damage occurs at this or any other time, to any item, school cannot be held responsible in any way.

Hair

- Pupils should adhere to the dress code and refrain from cutting their hair in outrageous styles or colours.
- Failure to comply with the dress code will result in disciplinary action being taken by the school.

Other Items

- Mobile phones, iPad's, radios and computer games.
- The school strongly advises pupils NOT to bring such items to school and as with jewellery; we cannot be held responsible for loss or damage.
